

Our Vision and Goals for 2021

At the past LLD in November, amongst our trainings and discussions, we discussed what we wanted our Vision and Goals for the next year to be. One of the things that influenced our decisions was knowing the mission of the Order of the Arrow and therefore, our the mission of our Lodge.

> The mission of this lodge is to fulfill the purpose of the Order of the Arrow as an integral part of the Boy Scouts of America through positive youth leadership under the guidance of selected capable adults.

Keeping the mission in our minds, we decided on the following for our 2021 Vision:

By the end of 2021, Dzie-Hauk Tonga Lodge sees itself better playing the integral role in Jayhawk Area Council as set to us in our. and the National OA's. Mission Statement by improving our membership, communication, activity involvement, camping promotion, and organization.

Below are the our 2021 Goals that will be the stepping stones to reaching our vision.

1. Membership:

- A. Host OA elections for more than 50% of the units in JAC by Fall Fellowship.
- B. Get and train 3+ Election Teams (1+ per chapter) by March who will be able to work to help schedule and conduct the OA elections.

2. Communication

- A. Continuously improve the Lodge Website. Rebuild the website to be more user-friendly, provide more useful information that more people will use.
- B. By the March LEC, verify/ update contact info for lodge members and their preferred method contact.
- C. Move the Lodge's main from of contact away from Facebook and to a more accessible method. Note: This does not mean we will stop pointing on the Facebook page. Facebook transition to posts will posts more along the lines of "Check out the Lodge's website for new info about Fellowship"
- D. Get OA Unit Representatives every unit Arrowmen by the April LEC. Use the Communication with the OA Reps and OA Rep Advisers to increase the direct communication with our members.

3. Greater Involvement and Activities

A. Push Chapters to effectively plan and carry out their activities monthly Service Projects. Use the OA Reps and Chapter meetings, along with multiple forms of communication to get the desired attendance.

4. Camping Promotion

- A. Under the direction of Tres. the Camping Promotion's Chairman, create a Guide on Where to Camp for camping spots withing the region.
- B. In addition to scheduling Unit elections, schedule Camping Promotion visits to at least 75% of the Troops in council. Note: Theses visits can be to promote FSR, the values of camping, specific camping skills, show off the new Lodge Camping Guide, or interview the unit for content for the Lodge Camping Guide.

5. Organization

- A. Make important and useful information more accessible to lodge members.
- B. Make event schedules by the LEC before the event and have them available for event promotion.

Note: any goal that doesn't have a specific deadline is either a continuous goal or a goal to complete by the end of the year.

How to be an OA Unit Rep

So you've become your unit's Order of the Arrow Representative. Now what? Or maybe your unit doesn't have an OA Rep. This article is here to guide you on how to be an effective OA Unit Representative and how representatives help both the unit and the Lodge.

'he OA Rep's primary job is to act as the liaison between the unit and the Lodge and Chapter. Below is a list of some of the OA Rep's Duties:

- Serve as a communication link between the lodge/ chapter and the unit.
- Help plan Unit Elections and Camp Promotion visits.
- Encourage year round and resident camping in the unit.
- Encourage older Scout participation in high adventure programs
- **Encourage Scouts to** actively participate in community service projects
- training in the unit.
- Encourage elected OA candidates to complete their induction.
- Encourage Arrowmen to assume leadership positions in the unit.
- **Encourage Arrowmen** in the unit to be active participants in the lodge and/or chapter activities.
- Sets a good example.
- Enthusiastically wears the Scout uniform correctly.
- Lives by the Scout Oat, Scout Law, and OA Obligation.
- **Show Scout Spirit**

- List of good activities for the site (ie: picnic, sightseeing, day hike, over-night camping, long-term camping, high-adventure, geocaching etc.)
- Facilities available (eating places, fire pits or similar, water, electric power, toilets, shelters, etc.)
- Site regulations (permits required, fees charged, fire regulations, etc)
- Special Features (swimming, boating, hiking trails, nature study area, fishing, conducted tours, etc.)
- What does your unit like to do there? Do you go for a specific reason?
- What does your unit like best about the camping area?


Time to Pay Your 2021 Dues!

Once again it is time to pay your annual OA dues. It is important for the lodge that you do this in a timely manner so that we will better know who in the lodge is active. Go to www.jayhawkcouncil.org/OA/TradingPost to pay your \$15.

Ctarting this year, the lodge is introducing an annual Year Patch. This patch is destined in the shape of a tessellation, meaning that, over time, you can fit all your Year Patches together. Maybe you'll put them on a patch jacket or blanket, or put on pages in a binder to see all the years you've been involved in the OA.

Pay your dues by **April 1st** and get this patch for only \$5.00



So how much does it cost? Well, it depends. If you pay your dues by April 1st, you will be able to purchase the patch at the minimum cost of \$5.00. But if you, missed the mark and didn't pay your dues on time, in addition to paying your dues, you will have to pay the increased price of \$15.00.

Unit Elections

Are you ready to help with Elections?

Once again it is time for one of the most important parts of the OA: Unit Elections. This year some temporary changes to unit elections have been implemented because of the pandemic (Visit www.oa-bsa.org for details).

We are looking for arrowmen who are willing to help with unit elections for this election cycle. It's a simple job and a great way to implement some cheerful service.

If you have never helped with an election before, it's really simple. After scheduling an election (the lodge will handle the majority of this process) you simply have to show up to the unit's meeting. An Adviser and at least one other youth will be there to help.

The first part of any election is describing what the OA is, how we focus on cheerful service, and how it is for those scouts who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives.

After talking about the OA, you then say who is eligible (the unit leader will help with this) and you have the scouts fill out a ballot. With the help of the adviser and other OA member helping with the election, you then count the ballots. For most units, at this point you then will announce who was elected in and tell them about what to expect next ("Come to the next Fellowship").

There's a few more things to know but that's the majority of it. We have experienced Arrowmen there to help you every step of the way.

Elections don't take long and this year may even be virtual through zoom making it easy to help conduct an election and then get back to your unit's meeting.
